

Conflict Minerals Policy Statement

On July 21, 2010, the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act was signed into law. The Dodd-Frank Act and related U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission rules require certain companies to disclose the extent to which the products they manufacture or contract to manufacture contain so called conflict minerals sourced from mines in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) or adjoining countries. Conflict minerals include tantalum, tin, tungsten and gold, which are used in many electronic components and computer products.

AcQ Inducom is unable to identify the country of origin or the smelter for the minerals that are used in the production of our electronic products. We are addressing our suppliers for their commitment to the "Conflict Minerals"-policy and entrust their compliance.

AcQ Inducom supports the goal of ending the violence and human rights abuses in the mining of certain minerals from mines in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) or adjoining countries. Violence in this region is partially funded by the exploitation and trade of "Conflict Minerals".

AcQ Inducom;

- supports the goals of the "Conflict Minerals" legislation
- is committed to conform to the above legislation and state that all AcQ Inducom products are free from "Conflict Minerals" by the merit of the fact that all our purchases of electronic components and parts used in our products are sourced only through OEMS or franchised distributors
- will take the necessary steps and switches to another supplier if we discover the use of "Conflict Minerals" in our supply chain.
